MEETING SUMMARY:

JANUARY 9 - FIELD TOUR OVERVIEW:

The field tour highlighted the challenges, opportunities and successes associated with the management of wildland fire and cross-boundary landscapes across North Florida and the SE. The impact of Hurricane Michael from 2018 was discussed and explored along with the challenges faced due to the destruction of forested landscape as it relates to both wildland fire and the ability to manage the land post hurricane. The group gained an understanding and respect for the extensive use of prescribed fire throughout the Southeastern United States, the public acceptance of that culture and the impacts as well as several firing techniques utilized to conduct a prescribed fire. Additionally, smoke management and air quality considerations were discussed and the relationship with public health officials (CDC, EPA, state and local officials) explored making the overall process positive for all parties involved. Further, managing the landscape across a variety of ownerships showed the collaborative nature in which managing the local landscape is a necessity and has been occurring for a long time.

SMOKE MANAGEMENT AND AIR QUALITY TO INCREASE THE USE OF PRESCRIBED FIRE FOR LANDSCAPE RESILIENCY

Objective:

To collectively identify methods to minimize air quality impacts from wildland fire over the long-term, improve the resiliency of landscapes to wildfire, and increase the health and safety of communities, firefighters and the public by using fire as a land management tool and explore the concept of preparing communities for smoke.

Discussion

Erik Svendsen (CDC), Anne Idsal (EPA), Wayne Cascio (EPA), and Mark Melvin (Coalition of Prescribed Fire Councils all presented a variety of topics around prescribed fire and smoke management opportunities. Discussion with the WFLC members followed with the Council coalescing around the following four opportunities.

NEXT STEPS:

- 1. Overarching Data Needs: The DOI Office of Policy Analysis with assistance from Coalition of Prescribed Fire Councils, the DOI Office of Wildland Fire, and FS Fire and Aviation Management will assemble a persuasive data set to support the use of prescribed fire to combat catastrophic wildland fires, with the understanding that issues such as the NAAQS and smoke inhalation have been an obstacle.
- 2. Develop joint messaging, talking points and opportunities for joint communications Develop Leaders' Intent that includes the scope and overall goal for the expanded use of prescribed fire to guide the subsequent development of focused, public communication and joint messaging that relates the benefits to public health and safety of prescribed fire versus wildfire. It was noted by Idsal, Svensen and Cascio that the material available doesn't capture the type of health effects from wildfire versus prescribed fire. The net health effect of the actual biomass burning emissions may be the same (although Cascio noted some species and combustion phases seem to have greater effects than others Eucalyptus and Pine versus others and flaming versus smoldering). Study and support for 24-hour and annual PM 2.5 effect versus shorter term was also mentioned as a need. The overarching data needs, deliverable 1, will be used to inform this effort.
- 3. <u>SIPs recognize Rx fire as part of baseline/background contributor</u> The revised Regional Haze Rule (RHR)(2017) and recent RHR Guidance (2019) provides an opportunity for States to include prescribed fire in the natural visibility endpoint. The endpoint addition is a similar process as used by contribution of international emissions to visibility

impairment whereby the addition is approved by the EPA Administrator. Most Class 1 areas have made greater progress than is required by the RHR towards the 2064 natural background goal without addition to the endpoint of either international or prescribed fire. It is important to establish the presence of prescribed fire contribution for the upcoming 2021 submittals as future periodic submittals will be more challenging to demonstrate reasonable progress towards the natural background goal and utilization of this clause of the RHR needs to occur in order to insure its use in the future.

4. Health impact assessments built at a national level - EPA-ORD and CDC-NCEH both suggested that a national Environmental Health Impact Assessment could be conducted which considers the effects of wildfire and prescribed fire on firefighter and public health. Public health would be considered in the broad definition of environmental health so it will be considerably broader than just air quality and could include water quality and quantity, climate effects and post-fire effects. The power of this approach is there is a process for this type of analysis that ties back to NEPA. Understanding that some modicum of funding would be needed and that the push from EPA leadership necessary to include engagement by ORD, the development and buildout of this process will be critical for WFLC membership to understand.

He also discussed USFA has been working with FS and DOI to fund a contractor that can be lead on compiling and writing the America Burning: WUI document. They are hopeful the posting will come out in FedBiz in early February.
